PASSION: n. "an intense desire that arouses enthusiasm"

Paul once had a passion for persecuting Christians. Then, he developed a PASSION for preaching the gospel. One passion was used for evil, one was used for good. It can work both ways...

1. Identify a passion you have for something: scrapbooking, reading, gardening, an athletic activity, homeschooling, music, knitting, etc. What is it about this activity that appeals to you? What does it do for you? For others?

2. As you think about the passion you identified above, what keeps you focused, even though there may be distractions or obstacles at times?

PURPOSE: n. "design, intention."

Paul realized that he had been created for God's design. He became focused solely on how his life would be used to help accomplish God's PURPOSES.

3. What do you think kept Paul focused, even though there were many troubles?

4. Using the same reasoning you utilized in Questions #2 (what keeps you focused) and #3 (God's design for YOU), how can you use what you know and not what you feel about a focused perspective and design for you, in order to help you see things differently in a difficult situation/relationship? What if you don't feel like it's working? What can the Holy Spirit tell you in those times?

(Your purpose and your needs are closely connected. We'll discuss "needs vs. desires" in the next lesson.)
